

Mr Neville Board, RN, BA, MPH, FACHI

**Chief Digital Health Officer
Department of Health and Human Services, Victoria**



Neville Board is Victoria's Chief Digital Health Officer and heads the Digital Health Branch. The Branch conducts health sector planning and assurance, sets standards for clinical systems, is implementing unique patient identification across Victorian health services, and is connecting health services to the My Health Record system. The Branch also leads the Victorian health service cyber security and ICT operational assurance programs.

Prior to coming to Victoria in 2018, Mr Board headed the eHealth and Medication Safety program at the Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care. His team conducted clinical safety assurance of the My Health Record, and developed three editions of the national guide to safe implementation of electronic medication management (EMM). He also convened the WHO clinical practice working group for the Global Patient Safety Challenge *Medication without Harm*.

Mr Board is a registered nurse and has worked in clinical, management, and informatics roles, including six years managing leprosy and primary care programs in the Brazilian Amazon. He implemented radiotherapy information systems and Area-based clinical cancer registries in NSW, and has published on hospital in the home, use of data in health care, short stay surgery and post-acute care.

Paul is an independent consultant specialising in Digital Health. His 35 year career path includes research, government, private sector and tertiary education.

A passionate contributor and advocate for digital health informatics standards, Trish is co-chair HL7 International Security Workgroup and national expert on health informatics, security and medical device ISO standards. She has authored over 130 medical information security and safety publications. With a community focus, she contributes to NPS MedicineWise Data Governance Committee, the HISA Board (2014-2020), and devotes time to the practical assessment of boutique gin and full-bodied red wine!

World Health Organization Collaborating Centre on Family Medicine and Primary Care



Professor Michael Kidd AM is an Australian academic, primary care researcher, educator and clinician, currently based in both Australia and Canada. He is the current Director of the World Health Organization Collaborating Centre on Family Medicine and Primary Care, and Chair of Family and

Community Medicine at the University of Toronto. He is also Senior Innovation Fellow with the Toronto Institute for Health System Solutions and Virtual Care, and Professorial Fellow with the Murdoch Children's Research Institute at the Royal Children's Hospital in Melbourne. He is an elected fellow of the Australian Academy of Health and Medical Sciences, a past President of the World Organization of Family Doctors (WONCA), a past President of the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners, and the former Executive Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences at Flinders University. His current Australian government appointments include chair of the Primary Healthcare Advisory Committee of the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, member of the Independent Expert Panel developing Australia's National Health Information Strategy, and member of the Australian Government's Health Care Home Implementation Advisory Group. He is a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors and is the chair of the Australian Alliance for Artificial Intelligence in Healthcare, and a member of the board of beyondblue, Telstra Health, Therapeutic Guidelines Limited, ModMed Institute, and Cornerstone Health. For ten years he was a member of the International Research Advisory Board of the United Kingdom Biobank based at Oxford University. He is one of the founders of both the Health Informatics Society of Australia and the Australian College of Health Informatics. In the 1990s, he was the Chair of the General Practice Computing Group (which included MSIA membership), during the widespread clinical computerisation of Australian General Practice, and also served on the boards of the Australian Government MediConnect and HealthConnect initiatives (the "precursors" to NeHTA and the Australian Digital Health Agency).

Professor David Watts
Professor of Information Law and Policy
La Trobe University



David Watts is one of Australia's leading data protection experts with experience as a regulator, policy maker, public and private sector lawyer.

As Victoria's privacy commissioner until 2017, David was responsible for an extensive change management program designed to reconceptualise the value of privacy and security for the state. He is a leader in strategic advice and has developed guidance to support information sharing, implement privacy by design and adopt safeguards for big data and technologies such as cloud computing and biometrics.

Expanding on his Victorian role, David is Professor of Information Law and Policy at La Trobe

University's Law School and Adjunct Professor of Law at the Deakin University Law School. He leads the task force on Big Data and Open Data for the United Nations Special Rapporteur on the Right to Privacy and is a member of the Privacy Advisory Group for UN Global Pulse. David is now taking on international projects and challenging new assignments in other Australian jurisdictions.
